# Reminder: Enroll for Health Insurance Now through HealthCare.gov

Consumers can now compare and purchase health insurance coverage online at HealthCare. gov. The open enrollment period for 2015 coverage started on November 15th, 2014 and will close on February 15, 2015. Consumers are also encouraged to visit HealthCare.gov to find out if they are eligible for financial assistance, which can help pay monthly costs and reduce out-of-pocket premiums.

Young adults who are about to turn 26 qualify for a special enrollment period that lets them enroll in a health plan outside of open enrollment. Adults about to turn 65 can keep their Marketplace plan until their Medicare coverage starts, after which they can cancel the Marketplace plan without penalty.

All consumers shopping for coverage in 2015 should enroll or re-enroll by December 15th, 2014 in order to have coverage effective January 1st, 2015. ### "Fresh Off the Boat" could be a landmark TV show for Asian Americans

I grew up with very few Asian Americans on television. My earliest memories were of Hop Sing, the Chinese cook on "Bonanza," a Western, with his long queue hanging from under his cap. Then, there was Fuji, the hapless Prisoner of War from "McHale's Navy," a sitcom about a crew of a PT boat during WWII.

Later in the 1960s came the first Asian I could be proud of, the butt-kicking martial arts-fighting driver Kato in the superhero series "Green Hornet," played by Bruce Lee, who would go on to become an icon in his 1970s kung fu movies. "Star Trek" brought us Sulu in "Star Trek," a revolutionary show for its time for its deliberate diversity.



There were TV shows in the 1970s with Asian Americans, but they were still supporting roles, not the star. The 1980s were dry years for JAs. It was the decade when African Americans came of age in pop culture with Bill Cosby's all-American black family, the Huxtables.

But in 1994, a young Korean American comedian, Margaret Cho, was cast in "All American Girl," the first Asian American family sitcom -- our version of the Huxtables. It may have been well-intended, but its non-Asian producers played up Asian stereotypes and eventually criticized Cho for her weight and told her she wasn't Asian enough. They forced her to work with a coach to be "more Asian." The series lasted only one season, and by the end the entire Asian American cast had been fired except for Cho and Amy Hill, who played the outlandish grandmother.

It's been 20 years since that debacle, and Asian Americans are finally plentiful onscreen, in bigger parts and a couple of starring roles. And, we're getting another shot at an Asian American family sitcom. "Fresh Off the Boat" has a lot of people, including me, excited, because this time the team behind the show is multicultural, with Asian American input.

"Fresh Off the Boat" is based on the memoir of the same title, written by Eddie Huang, a celebrity New York City chef. The series is about his Taiwanese family's experiences when they move from Washington DC's Chinatown to a white Orlando, Florida suburb in 1994, when Eddie was 11. The show will debut on Wednesday, February 4 with two new episodes (before and after "Modern Family"), and then settle into its weekly schedule on Tuesdays starting February 10.

The trailers that have been released are funny, and show that a lot has changed in Hollywood since "All American Girl." The executives behind "FOTB" are racially diverse, and Asian Americans are part of the writing team. Eddie Huang is a producer. And Hudson Yang, the 10-year-old star who plays the young Eddie Huang, is the son of Wall Street Journal columnist and Asian American media pioneer Jeff Yang, who's been writing about his son's adventure for the past year.

As Jeff Yang says with his Dad hat on, not his journalist's skeptic hat: "The show is like nothing you will have ever seen before on television. If it makes it to air, it will blow minds, raise eyebrows and, to quote a line that my son says as Little Eddie, 'change the game.' I would honestly say the same if I weren't the lead actor's father. It's that different. And provocative. And, yes, gut-bustingly funny."


We should all tune in and give this series the chance it deserves.

### Local Spotlight: San Jose JACL Holds Event as Part of LGBT History Month

In recognition of LGBT History Month, on October 19th, San Jose JACL presented "Onuma: Queer Perspectives on Wartime Incarceration" by Dr. Tina Takemoto, an artist and Associate Professor of Visual Studies at California College of the Arts in San Francisco. Based on her work examining issues of queer identity, race, memory and grief, Dr. Takemoto has received several art grants, and her articles have appeared in many journals. She is the Board President of the Queer Cultural Center and co-founder of Queer Conversations on Culture and the Arts.

Through the personal photo collection of Jiro Onuma, a gay Issei immigrant, and her own research and analysis, Dr. Takemoto gave the audience gathered at the historic Issei Memorial Building in San Jose a glimpse of the life of Mr. Onuma, likely difficult because of his need to both hide and to express his sexuality, before, during, and after the WWII

incarceration of Japanese Americans in which he was included. The importance of Jiro Onuma's story was made apparent when Dr. Takemoto recounted her intentions to create a documentary of LGBT stories of the WWII era only to discover that she was unable to find such stories.

# JACL NY/SC Hosts Youth Summit "A Seat at the Table: Having a Voice in the Discussion on Racism in America"

On Saturday, November 8th, a number of students and young professionals took part in a youth summit hosted by the JACL National Youth/Student Council (JACL NY/SC) held at George Washington University in Washington, D.C.

Themed "A Seat at the Table: Having a Voice in the Discussion on Racism in America," the summit began with introductions and an icebreaker led by JACL National Youth Representative Michelle Yamashiro. The morning workshop focused on identifying the causes and real-world consequences of Asian and Japanese American stereotypes. After lunch and a financial planning presentation by Ms. Anh Nguyen of event sponsor State Farm Insurance, JACL NY/SC Board Members Kota Mizutani and Emi Kamemoto moderated a panel discussion featuring Ms. Rita Pin Ahrens of the Southeast Asian Resource Action Center

(SEARAC), Mr. Corey Saylor from the Council of American-Islamic Relations (CAIR), Mr. Hilary Shelton of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), and Ms. Carmen Ye of the Conference of Asian-Pacific American Leadership (CAPAL). The panel discussion and subsequent small-group session revolved around advancing issues through coalition building. The speakers, facilitators, and participants then discussed strategies to engage dissimilar, uninformed, or apathetic individuals or groups as allies, and ways youth can become stronger advocates for their causes and communities.
