



Congress Urged to Strengthen Family Based Immigration System

On March 13, 2013, the JACL signed onto a letter to President Obama and to all members of Congress, urging for them to protect and strengthen the family-based immigration system as they develop immigration reform legislation. As of November 2012, nearly 4.3 million people are waiting in the family visa backlogs, including over 1.8 million Asian and Pacific Islanders waiting abroad for the chance to reunite with their family members.

A strong family-based immigration system has significant economic benefits, as family-based immigrants foster the development of small and medium-sized businesses. An immigration system that truly reflects our nation's values must be inclusive by recognizing that strong families create a much-needed foundation for our communities and our economy to grow and succeed.

Mile High JACL Board Embraces Advocacy As Priority

Although JACL was founded as a civil rights organization in 1929, the Mile High chapter hasn't always been actively involved in advocacy of social justice issues.

But last month, the Mile High Board voted to actively support and engage in political advocacy, and to support legislation that fits with our community goals and civil rights mission. The change isn't so drastic - we already have a track record of activism:

Last year, Mile High JACL endorsed Senate Bill 12-002 (also known as the "Civil Union Bill") and proudly took an active role with this bill and helped locate speakers who would be willing to testify in favor of the bill. In addition, our members called their elected representatives and urged them to vote in favor of the bill. After a year of ups and downs, the bill finally passed this year and Gov. Hickenlooper has just signed it into law!

We also worked together with OCA Colorado, APA for Progress, and NAAPIMHA in 2012 to organize a panel discussion marking the 30th anniversary of the murder of Vincent Chin and the continuing discrimination facing the Asian American Pacific Islander community. Chin, a Chinese American, was beaten to death by out-of-work Detroit auto workers who blamed Japanese cars for their economic woes. We will always focus on civil rights and issues of hate crimes, racism and racial stereotypes.

During the election season, Mile High JACL partnered with Just Vote! Colorado Election Protection (JVCEP), a nonpartisan election protection program created to assist voters with election activities, expand access to information about the voting process, and to monitor the electoral process across the state.

Of course, the chapter is committed to continue hosting our signature annual event, the Day of Remembrance, to keep alive the memory of the unjust incarceration of Japanese Americans during World War II.

This month, the Mile High Board voted to approve three main areas of advocacy that we will pursue this coming year, and we're looking to YOU, our membership, to help us achieve success in these areas: Immigration (Justin Valas, Chair); Same-Sex Marriage (Harry Budisidharta, Chair) and Health Care (Suzy Shimasaki, Chair). We'd love to have your input on these topics, as well as volunteers to help us testify and publicize the issues.

JACL Urges Boy Scouts to Lift Ban on Openly Gay Members and Leaders

The Boy Scouts of America maintains a policy that was established over twenty years ago which states "...homosexual conduct is inconsistent with the requirements in the Scout Oath that a Scout be morally straight and in the Scout Law that a Scout be clean in work and deed, and that homosexuals do not provide a desirable role model for Scouts..." The position further states that "... Because of these beliefs, the Boy Scouts of America does not accept homosexuals as members or as leaders, whether in volunteer or professional capacities..."

As a civil rights organization, the Japanese American Citizens League (JACL) believes America's truest character is expressed when access to opportunities are provided equitably to all persons. We believe these opportunities should not be limited by race, religion, ancestry, gender, national origin, disability or sexual orientation.

The acceptance of Japanese Americans as full participants to our society was not always the case. There was a time when we were ostracized and excluded from full participation in the mainstream of American society. Thus, we are aware that living on the fringes of acceptance is a denigrating and dehumanizing existence. However, the unique characteristic of our society is that it evolves and provides a place for everyone to participate and to be what they are.

It is important, even for private organizations, to recognize the value in accepting diversity. The JACL urges the Boy Scouts of America to lift its ban on openly gay individuals so they may fully participate as members and leaders.

Hickenlooper Signs Colorado Civil Unions Act

March 21st was a proud day for Colorado.

Gov. John Hickenlooper signed a bill into law that will allow civil unions for same-sex couples in Colorado.

For the first time, same-sex couples will have many of the same rights, protections and obligations of heterosexual couples, which will lead to more financially stable, self-sufficient and mutually supportive households. Now, children of same-sex couples will have greater protection and security.

We commend the governor and lawmakers who supported this law, which couldn't have happened without the support of the people of Colorado. Our state is a much more tolerant place now than it was in 1992, when voters approved an anti-gay-rights constitutional amendment that was later overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court.

Times and attitudes have changed, and all of Colorado deserves to share in today's achievement.

We have long supported expanding civil rights, including providing for civil unions for same-sex couples. But let's not forget that this action is only a partial victory. The work is not finished. Same-sex couples in our state have more rights today, but they do not have equal rights.

When that happens, there will be cause for greater celebration.

Leo Goto

I first met Leo Goto in the early 80's and then had the opportunity to work closely with him during the formative early years of the Go For Broke Golf Tournament. The golf committee of 3-4 met for early morning coffee and goodies at the Wellshire Inn and for the first couple of years, we were elated to have 40 - 50 golfers (and that was with some begging).

During the intervening years, he bought multiple cases of fresh Palisade peaches for my Rotary group's fundraiser to be used by the chefs at Wellshire.

He asked me to review his personal insurance policies at which time, I met his second beautiful wife, Linda, at their home on 7th Avenue.

More recently, about 3 years ago, I went to his new Riverwalk Restaurant as a possible site for Mile High's April event. He was not there, so Jim and I walked back toward my car in the parking lot. He had just arrived, arms full of papers and files, looking a bit tired, but still with that million dollar smile and warm hello. When I told him of my purpose for the visit, he offered to decrease the rental cost of the facility to an affordable price for Mile High.

What an incredibly classy gentleman - Leo was an icon and he will be sorely missed. I will always fondly remember Leo and hold him in the highest regard.

Leo Goto dies: Denver restaurateur was philanthropist and friend

Legendary Denver restaurateur Leo Goto, whose family emigrated to Denver from Japan in 1942, has died.

Former Colorado State University chancellor Joe Blake, a friend since elementary school, said Goto succumbed on March 3 in Sacred Journey Hospice in McDonough, Ga. He had moved to Georgia several months ago to be close to his daughter, Leilani Dobbins, after being diagnosed with Stage IV liver cancer in 2012.

Goto's health had been in decline since the 2010 collapse of a restaurant and events center that he operated briefly in Littleton. He was 76.

Funeral arrangements are pending.

Goto's career had a humble start: washing dishes in the Denver branch of Trader Vic's, located in the former Cosmopolitan Hotel. He quickly earned the trust and respect of owner Victor Bergeron, who promoted him to general manager and enlisted him to help open additional locations of the upscale eatery in London, Houston and Portland.

In 1969, with financial backing from longtime friends Larry Atler and Howard Torgove, Goto ventured into restaurant ownership with the opening Leo's Place at 16th and Broadway. Leo's Place became an instant hit, drawing nightly Who's Who crowds until the property was condemned to make way for an RTD station and high-rise buildings.

In 1976, the partners opened the Wellshire Inn on South Colorado Boulevard. Torgove bought out Goto's interest in 2008.

"He was a very unique and special human being, that's for sure," Torgove said, adding that they had met while serving in the Air National Guard at Buckley Air Force Base.

"I worked in supply and he was in the kitchen," Torgove recalled. "I noticed right away that the food was always better when Leo was cooking."

Atler and Goto became friends when they both were elected to the student council at East High School.

"Leo was a marvelous greeter with an incredible memory," Atler said. "He knew everyone's story; plus, he was a real sweet guy."

Goto was "the consumate host," adds restaurant consultant John Imbergamo. "He was the superstar face of restaurants long before restaurants started to be identified by their chefs."

Generous to a fault, Goto rarely said no to charities seeking donations of food or money. He was the youngest person to be inducted into the Colorado Restaurant Association's Foodservice Hall of Fame and in 1995 the University of Denver Alumni Association gave him its highest honor, the Evans Award.

"Leo was a mentor to many current restaurant owners and employees," said CRA president/CEO Peter Meersman. "He always put others first," added Holly Arnold Kinney, whose late father, Sam Arnold, owner of The Fort, had been one of Goto's best friends.

When his 5-year-old son, Mark, was killed in an accident in Detroit, Goto coped with his grief by volunteering at what is now Children's Hospital Colorado.

"He spent so much time there, and helped so many families, that the staff started calling him Dr. Goto," Atler said.

A former University of Denver trustee, Goto chaired the boards of the Colorado State Advisory Committee to the U.S.

Commission on Civil Rights, the Colorado-Wyoming Chefs d'Cuisine Association and the Colorado Board of Environmental Health.

In addition to daughter Leilani and her husband, Kevin Dobbins, of McDonough, Goto is survived by his son Tim and daughter-in-law Jennifer Goto of Highlands Ranch; brothers Ben and Al Goto; sisters Lillian Sato and Rose Sakurai; and three grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his first wife, Helen; his ex-wife, Linda died in November.

Floyd Mori Honored at Japanese Ambassador's Residence

At a special ceremony and reception on March 14, 2013, in Washington, D.C. at the residence of the Japan Ambassador, Mr. Shiro Floyd Mori received the Order of the Rising Sun, Gold Rays with Rosette. Mr. Mori was among 46 foreign recipients of the 2012 Fall Imperial Decorations by the Government of Japan. The award was presented by Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of Japan to the United States of America, the Honorable Kenichiro Sasae. The honor was initiated by former Ambassador Ichiro Fujisaki, who retired from the post and returned to Tokyo in the fall of 2012.t

Mr. Mori, National Executive Director Emeritus and formerly National Executive Director and National President of the Japanese American Citizens League (JACL), was presented with the award in recognition of his significant contributions to the improvement of the status of Japanese Americans, strengthening of economic relations between Japan and the United States, and the promotion of Japanese culture in the United States. He was recognized for his work, through the JACL and Direct Relief International, in assisting Japan following the earthquake and tsunami which struck Japan in March 2011. He organized and established the first Nihon Matsuri (Japan Festival) in Salt Lake City and the first National JACL Gala in Washington, D.C.

Among a countless list of significant accomplishments, he has worked extensively with Japan business and government leaders and has made many trips to Japan. He has been in charge of taking government groups representing California and Utah on official visits to Japan. He represented the JACL, while National JACL President, along with former Vice President Dan Quayle who represented the United States at a ceremony in Tokyo with the Prime Minister of Japan to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the Treaty of Peace with Japan.

In 2005, Mr. Mori became the Director of Public Policy for the JACL, the nation's oldest and largest Asian American civil and human rights organization, in their Washington, D.C. office. He then served as National Executive Director until June 2012. JACL congratulates Mr. Mori on this significant achievement.
